A Bit of AA History: 1960's & 70's

The 60's continues the "Golden Age" of aviation. The late 50's brought on jet aircraft, the B707. Are you of the age where you remember the "conversation" seating in first class on the 707? Wide sets with a respectable 36" to 40" pitch (nowadays is more like 28").

Passengers dressed up for a flight. Men in suits and ties, ladies in smart outfits

with high heels. Fur coats were common.

In the 60's AA introduced the 3-engine B727, BAC-1-11, and the B747 with the staircase, and piano bar.

First Class meals could be five or more courses. Flights with "Captain's Table" and Chicago's Blackhawk Restaurant



"Spinning Salad Bowl" originated from New York and O'Hare to the West Coast. The stewardess uniforms got less conservative. From pill box hat to raccoon hat in a few years. Introduced in '67 were short dresses in red,

white, or blue turned out to be a hit with male passengers. After a few months all were asked to lower their hemlines. Apparently too much skin or girdle was shown in reaching into the overhead rack.





You saw movie stars on flights (prior to corporate aviation). I remember Dustin Hoffman asking me if he could upgrade to first class. Do you remember the packs of 4 cigarettes on meal trays? No wheels on suitcases? Smoke filled cabins. Hijackings? Safety has improved over the years. During the 60's there was a crash and fatalities somewhere every year. Today, safer but miserable to endure. Travel was

smooth, fast, expensive, and luxurious across most large airlines.

The 70's came with a brand-new airplane, the DC-10. American also acquired Trans Caribbean and AA joined other majors in the hiring of men in the cabin. New routes opened; Sydney, Auckland, American Samoa, to name a few. Time for a uniform change for the newly named <u>flight attendants</u>. The Americana collection was red, blue, or plaid complete with a racoon hat. If you ever saw a fuzzy tail dangling from a flight attendant's suitcase that was probably a hat. Another first was the hiring of the first female pilot Bonnie Caputo who took the helm of the B727.



Those who live in Chicago area especially remember Flight #191 in 1979 that crashed after take-off (it could be seen from AA Operations). All AA personnel were deeply affected over the loss of passengers and crew. The Chicago Kiwi Club assisted in identifying passengers, keeping records, etc. at the AA hangar. There is a permanent memorial in Des Plaines, Illinois. People gather every other year to remember.

Being a stewardess/flight attendant was a dream job for those young and adventurous. Stewardesses/Flight Attendants were either handsome or beautiful and always perfectly groomed and looked like movie stars! *I loved every minute of it.*
